YEU Cyprus was established in 1995 as a Cypriot local civil organization (NGO), aiming to foster closer co-operation and better understanding among the young people of the world by exchanging information, experiences and ideas, on cultural, educational and social issues. YEU Cyprus is affiliated with YEU International platform. It is a full member of Cyprus Youth Council (CYC) - the official coordinating body of Cypriot Youth Organizations. It implements several activities including workshops, field trips and training courses and it organizes and participates in various international and local events to foster tolerance and mutual respect among youngsters. Recording Tradition

Traditions and customs are some of the most integral parts of one's cultural identity. The European identity is composed of various cultures, each one with its own set of traditions, which together lay the foundation for the creation of a stronger collective European identity. However, some of Europe's oldest traditions have started to fade for many reasons, sometimes because the people practicing them have grown too old to do so or because those traditions have been replaced by new ones. Thus, there is a need for young people to get to know the traditions of their countries and of those of other countries. In that way they might stop rejecting them and use this knowledge wisely to move forward.

The aim of this project is to cultivate historical empathy and pay homage to "endangered" or





forgotten traditions around Europe. The main goal is to allow youngsters from European countries to become aware of the traditions of their countries and be introduced to traditions from other countries that have started to die out, while exploring and practicing the art of storytelling through photography and video-making.

All the activities will be learner-centered and passive listening will be avoided. The working methods used will be non-formal education methods that will allow the participants to acquire new skills, learn, and share knowledge and ideas. The activities will include energizers, ice-breaking games, teambuilding exercises, interactive presentations, peer to peer education, experiential learning, group work, visits to museums, churches, youth clubs, workshops, role-playing, simulations, brainstorming etc. Particular workshops will be designed for video-making, photography, storytelling, shadow theater and more. The participants will have the time to reflect on their own and in groups, based on what they will learn. The goal is for them to learn and then share this knowledge when they go back to their countries. Working methods will be adapted based on the participants' characteristics, needs and interests.

Objectives

- For the participants to learn about the traditions of their own country and get to know the traditions of other European countries.
- To fill the gap between the past and the present since we have realised that there is a gap of knowledge about the past, especially in younger generations.
- To give people the skills to be able to search and learn about the past.

CYPRUS

- To raise awareness about the traditions of different countries and allow young people to learn and use this knowledge and even turn it into a profession, fighting unemployment at the same time.
- To enforce intergenerational dialogue by allowing the young people to listen to the older ones and vice versa. During the activities of the project the participants will have the





chance to meet the local people of a traditional Cypriot village to conduct oral history interviews.

- To improve the level of English of the participants.
- To familiarize the participants with storytelling and videography techniques in the context of understanding the past.

Profile Of The Participants

- ✓ 4 participants aged 18-30 years old and 1 group leader with no age limit.
- ✓ Basic knowledge on tradition or photography or video making or involvement in tradition (dance, music, arts, crafts etc)
- ✓ Able to communicate and follow the activities of the Youth Exchange in the English language.
- ✓ Willingness to gain new knowledge, skills and competences in the field of tradition, mainly through non-formal and informal education methods.
- ✓ Desire to explore forgotten traditions in Europe.
- ✓ Desire to learn and practice storytelling and videography techniques in the context of understanding the past.
- ✓ Interest in learning about other cultures and sharing their skills and knowledge with other participants.
- ✓ Interest in improving their group management skills, in the context of a youth exchange (applicable only for youth leaders).
- ✓ Desire to organise and facilitate non-formal education activities for youth (applicable only for youth leaders).

Venue

The Youth Exchange will take place in the old primary school of Dymes Village that has been turned into a modern camping site. Participants will be accommodated in dorms of 6 or 7 people, separately males and females, with a private bathroom. Sessions and workshops will take place in the big room of the venue or in the big yard under the forest as well us in nearby villages and the city of Limassol The venue is equipped with the necessary first aid kits.

Dymes is a small village in the mountainous region of Limassol and is at the heart of the "Pitsilia" region, between the villages of Kyperounta, Pelendri and Agros, at a distance of 59 kilometres from Nicosia and 40 kilometers from Limassol. Dymes is built at an average altitude of 960 meters above the sea level and receive an average annual rainfall of about 750 millimetres. Mainly vines for winemaking varieties, vegetables, and fruit-trees are cultivated in the village's region. The village of Dymes is known for its apple production, which is ranked amongst the best varieties of Cyprus. A few olive, carob, almond, and walnut trees are also cultivated. The traditional houses, the ascending roads, the irregular terrain, the vine-arbours, the small yards with the tall fences, the tiled and tin roofs of the houses, and the picturesque upper-floors compose the basic image of the village. The houses, most of them made with local stone, are -to a great degree -in harmony with the natural environment.







Weather

The average temperature in Dymes Village during October is usually 15.1°C. Minimum temperature is 10.7°C and maximum 19.5°C. Make sure that you have enough warm clothes and something to protect you in case of rain.

Travelling Days

18/10 Arrival day. Try to be in Cyprus before 17:00 as we will go the venue by private bus.

29/10 Departure day. We will arrange a bus from the venue to Larnaka or Paphos airport according to the need of your flights. Usually, we book the bus at around 09.30 and it needs one and a half hour for Larnaka airport and one hour and twenty minutes for Paphos airports. So, we recommend you to book tickets after 13:00

Travelling To Cyprus

In Cyprus, there are two international airports that you can use; the Larnaka and the Paphos airports. Be careful since travelling from Ercan Airport cannot and will not be reimbursed as it is not an official airport of the European Union.

Please, send us your reservation for travel tickets as soon as you book them at projects@yeu-cyprus.org

- Tickets <u>must</u> be from your country of origin to/from Cyprus. No other tickets can or will be reimbursed. Transit tickets are also eligible.
- You are allowed to come only 2 days before or after the project dates.
- Accommodation for <u>any extra days</u> before or after the training course <u>cannot and will not</u> be funded.





Please be in Cyprus on the 18/10 no later than 17:00 since we are going to the location of the event by private bus and there is no other way to reach the village in the middle if you arrive late.

The documents needed to complete your reimbursement:

To proceed with your travel reimbursement, you must present, upon request, the following:

- 1. Boarding passes (you will NOT be refunded without them!)
- 2. Relevant tickets or a copy of those (plane, train, bus, etc.)

Some Facts About Cyprus

Floating on the waters of the European Mediterranean, but pointing longingly towards the shores of Syria, Turkey and Lebanon, Cyprus is an odd mixture. It is a kaleidoscopic blend: its cultural influences are dominated by Western Europe, but its geographic proximity to Asia and Africa gives it more than just a hint of the East. Long coveted by



mainland Greece and Turkey, this small island has its own definite and beguiling character.



Cyprus is the island for all seasons, the island of good weather, good mood and loads of sunshine! Cypriot people are warm-hearted, hospitable and kind, people who love to go out and who appreciate good company and good food. In fact, most of the social outings and relationships revolve around food! And food that is coming in a lot of variety and large quantities for massive stomachs! While in Cyprus, it's

a must to try/taste:

Cypriot *meze* (appetizers akin to Spanish *tapas*) are an art form, and some restaurants serve nothing but this. Meze is available in a meat or fish variety, but quite often comes as a mixed batch, which is rather pleasing.







Sheftalia, which is a kind of sausage without skin. The filling of sheftalia is made of ground pork or lamb shoulder and leg. It is mixed with fine chopped onions and parsley and seasoned with

salt and pepper. Instead of sausage casing it uses caulk fat, the membrane that covers the stomach of a lamb or pig, to wrap the ingredients. In words it may not sound so good but it's super delicious!!!

- *Halloumi* is a uniquely Cypriot cheese, made from a mix of cow's and sheep's milk. Hard and salty when raw, it mellows and softens when cooked and is, hence, often served grilled.
- *Taramosalata* is traditionally made of *taramas*, the salted roe of the cod or carp. The roe is either mixed with bread crumbs or mashed potatoes. Parsley, onion, lemon juice, olive oil and vinegar are added and it is seasoned with salt and pepper.

Historical Facts

Originally, Cyprus was inhabited mainly by Greek Cypriots constituting 83% of the population; and Turkish Cypriots reaching the 17%. However, problems arose between the two communities that led to bi-communal conflicts and violence, with Turkey invading Cyprus in 1974 and occupying 37% of the island. The results of 1974 were disastrous for Cyprus, for both of the communities, Greek and Turkish Cypriot, with thousands of people being killed, hundreds of thousands becoming refugees in their own country. Since then, Cyprus and its capital Nicosia have been divided between the Greek Cypriot and Turkish Cypriot communities in the south and north respectively. On the 23rd of April 2003, as part of efforts to reunify the island, several checkpoints were opened so that people from the two communities could move freely from one part of the island to the other. Nicosia retains the distinction of being the world's last divided capital.

Religions

Cyprus enjoys an exceedingly high level of freedom of worship. While the majority of Greek-Cypriots are Greek-Orthodox Christians, other denominations are represented on the island, including Armenians, Maronites and Roman Catholics. The Turkish-Cypriot community is predominantly Muslim.
